

Crime Victims' Rights

1. You have the right to be treated with fairness, respect and dignity and be free from harassment during the process.
2. You have the right to know exactly what your role is in the criminal justice system.
3. You have the right to be present and heard at important criminal and juvenile justice hearings.
4. You have the right to be heard, and that right may include oral, written, audio taped, or a videotaped statement to be provided or included in the presentence report.
5. You have the right to receive notice of important criminal justice hearings.
6. Victims of violent and sexual crimes may request a pretrial no contact order be issued by the court.
7. You have the right to a speedy disposition of the charges, free from unwarranted delays.
8. You have the right have the sentencing judge consider information about the impact of the crime upon the victim.
9. You have the right have a representative exercise these same rights the victim is entitled to.
10. You have the right to receive restitution and have personal property returned when case is over.

CHILDREN HAVE THESE ADDITIONAL RIGHTS:

1. Children under 13 have the right to be communicated with in an age-appropriate language.
2. You have the right **NOT** to feel responsible for what has happened to you. No one should try to make you think you are.
3. You have a right have the process conducted in the most effective and least traumatic, intrusive and intimidating manner.
4. You have the right to have interviews related to the criminal prosecution kept to a minimum.

Process in a Criminal Case

1. Once the investigation is completed, the assigned Attorney will screen the case for charges to be filed with the Weber County Attorney's Office.
2. Please provide current information to the officer so our office can keep you informed of the criminal case. Or let our office know if your address/contact information changes.
3. If charges are filed, a victim impact statement will be sent to the victim for completion. Please return within 30 days so we can protect your rights.
4. After the defendant's initial appearance, notifications will be sent out to the victim until the case is closed.
5. If the defendant is convicted a sentencing date will be set. Victims are encouraged to attend the sentencing hearing where they can speak about the impact of their case.
6. If applicable, restitution will then be ordered at the time of sentencing. Defendants will have until the end of probation or parole to pay off restitution.
7. Personal effects held in evidence can be released 30 days after sentencing. The prosecutor must sign a release form. Contact our office for assistance.
8. If charges are not filed, any physical evidence may be returned or destroyed to the victim with authorization from our office.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Can a victim of a crime dismiss the charges once they have been filed against a defendant?

A: No. It is the Weber County Attorney's Office that is prosecuting the defendant for breaking the law, only the prosecutor can dismiss the charges.

Q: How do I find out when a defendant is going to be released from Jail or Prison?

A: Call VINE link (Victim Information Now Everyday) at 1-866-277-7477, register at www.vinelink.com or download their mobile app (VINELink). They will notify you of any change in custody for the defendant.

Q. How do I apply for counseling and financial help with my medical bills?

A. Contact Utah Office for Victims of Crime. You must fill out an application and be approved. Call 801-238-2360 or go online at www.crimevictim.utah.gov for an application.

Q: I am the victim of a crime. When am I required to be present in court?

A: You are not required to be in court unless you receive a subpoena (green paper) to appear and testify. As a victim, you have the right to be present at any court hearing. If you would like you can attend.

Q: There was restitution ordered in my case. How do I get my money?

A: For payment information if you have not received payment for more than 90 days, contact the Second District Court (restitution clerk) at 801-395-1079 or email 2webermorgand@utcourts.gov. Visit www.utcourts.gov for the self-help center.

Q. If the defendant gets sentenced to prison, how do I get my restitution?

A. The court will send the restitution to the Utah State Debt Collection Office. You can call them at 801-957-7700 or visit their website at <https://finance.utah.gov/office-state-debt-collection> for further information. Make sure to update their office if your address changes.
