Illustrated below are acceptable curbside recycling items for your city's household curbside recycling program and non-recyclable items for your trash container.

Recyclable Items

- All numbered household plastics
- All paper that tears
- Aluminum cans
- Cardboard boxes
- Cereal boxes
- Detergent boxes
- Empty aerosol cans
- Empty motor oil containers
- Envelopes
- File folders
- Frozen food boxes
- Juice boxes
- Junk mail
- Magazines
- Medicine boxes
- Metal pots, pans & lids
- Metal hangers
- Mixed paper
- Newspapers and Inserts
- Paper egg cartons
- Plastic bottles and containers
- Plastic milk jugs
- Plastic water and pop bottles
- Soft covered books
- Telephone books
- Tin or steel cans
- White or colored paper

Non-Recyclable Items

- Bush, grass or tree clippings
- Bubble wrap
- Cellophane
- Clothes
- Dishware
- Dry cleaning bag
- Electronic waste
- Facial tissue
- Food
- Food-stained paper
- Garden hoses
- Glass bottles
- Household chemicals
- Medical waste
- Padded envelopes
- Sharps or needles
- Tyvec-type envelopes
- Used bathroom tissue or paper towels
- Used household batteries
- Window glass

Please wash out food container(s) completely before placing in recycling bin!

Alternative Solutions to Putting Non-Recyclable Items in Your Trash Bin

1. Bush, Grass or Tree Clippings – Create your own home compost pile. See Ace Hardware, Lowe's Home Improvement, Home Depot or other local hardware or garden stores for information on how to set-up and use in your garden and yard. You can also bring your bush, grass and tree clippings to the Weber County Transfer Station at 867 Wilson Lane, Ogden, Utah for composting.
2. Clothing – Please donate to local charities for reuse to companies like Deseret Industries, Salvation Army, Red Cross, etc. These stores provide important employment opportunities for friends in our community.
3. Electronic Waste or E-Waste – Call Stone Castle Recycling in Clearfield, Utah at (801) 825-2422 or electronic stores to see if they can recycle your electronic waste.
4. Medical Waste, Sharps and Needles – Consult with your local pharmacy or physician for proper methods to disposal of your medical, sharps and needles waste.
5. Used Household Batteries – Check www.Call2Recycle.org for Wal-Mart, Best Buy, Radio Shack, Home Depot stores that will take back your used household batteries.

Thank you for **not** putting non-recyclable items in your curbside recyclable bin. By placing non-recyclable items in your curbside bin, it only increases the operating costs of our recycling company and reduces the rebate back to your local city and Weber County.
