## CHALLENGE COST SHARE AGREEMENT Between WEBER, COUNTY OF And The USDA, FOREST SERVICE NTERMOUNTAIN REGION UINTA-WASATCH-CACHE NATIONAL FOREST OGDEN RANGER DISTRICT

This CHALLENGE COST SHARE AGREEMENT is hereby made and entered into by and between Weber, County of, hereinafter referred to as "WC," and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Forest Service, Intermountain Region, Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forest, Ogden Ranger District hereinafter referred to as the "U.S. Forest Service," under the authority: Department of Interior and Related Agencies Appropriation Act of 1992, Pub. L. 102-154.

<u>Background</u>: Weber County and the U.S. Forest Service, Ogden Ranger District have a long-term relationship of working together to improve and protect the surrounding community. We continue to strive to support goals and challenges within Weber County and on National Forest System (NFS) land by attracting, retaining, and developing an environment where safety, innovation and customer service are paramount.

<u>Title</u>: Pineview Reservoir Recreation Complex Reconstruction - Phase 2 Planning and Design (P&D)

#### I. PURPOSE:

The purpose of this agreement is to document the cooperation between the parties to provide the framework for authorized planning, design and survey work between the U.S. Forest Service and WC in regards to the Pineview Reservoir Recreation Complex Reconstruction projects in accordance with the following provisions and the hereby incorporated Operating and Financial Plan, attached as Exhibit A.

The Pineview Reservoir Reconstruction P & D project will address issues of health and public safety by utilizing the amenities of highly developed recreation opportunities. A total of fifteen sites will be analyzed in efforts to address increased and sustained use around the reservoir. These sites include: Pelican/Quist Beach, Spring Creek, Windsurfer/Pineview West Trailhead, Port Ramp, BOR Fishing Access/Salamander Day Use, Old Highway Fishing, Anderson Cove Campground, Bluff Picnic Area (Cemetery Point), Bluff Swimming Area (Cemetery Point), Cemetery Point Boat Ramp, Middle Inlet Beach, North Arm Trailhead, Winter's Grove Trail and Trailheads, Narrows Fishing/Open Swim, and Pineview Dam.



Improved waste management will be implemented to control trash and human waste at some sites. Parking will be planned and designed to improve traffic flow and reduce public parking on roadways. The project will improve visitor access and the overall experience through the planning and design of improved facilities, up-to-date information, and better overall site and amenity organization. Accessibility is a major consideration; therefore, the existing developed sites will be redesigned for accessibility upgrades to modern standards, and the newly developed sites will address accessibility in the planning and design phase to ensure implementation during the construction of future phases.

#### II. STATEMENT OF MUTUAL BENEFIT AND INTERESTS:

The mission of the WC is to provide customer friendly public service and financial stability, ensure public trust, and strive for continuous improvement. WC accomplishes this mission by providing efficient, effective, equitable and appropriate services to the public with a qualified, cooperative, customer-oriented team. WC will conduct the affairs of the County government in such a way as to nurture public confidence and achieve and maintain financial stability. WC will use technology to take advantage of its capabilities, to stay abreast of changes and to maintain a secure environment.

The U.S. Forest Service sustains the health, diversity, and productivity of the Nation's forests and grasslands to meet the needs of present and future generations. The U.S. Forest Service commitment to land stewardship and public service is the framework within which natural resources are managed. Through implementation of land and resource management plans, the agency ensures sustainable ecosystems by restoring and maintaining species diversity and ecological productivity that helps provide recreation, water, timber, minerals, fish, wildlife, wilderness, recreation and aesthetic values for current and future generations of people.

WC and the U. S. Forest Service will benefit from the ability to work together to provide enhanced communication, community support, natural resource management and protection, public involvement and safety, and sustain the health, diversity and productivity of our local county and National Forest.

In Consideration of the above premises, the parties agree as follows:

#### III. THE WC SHALL:

A. <u>LEGAL AUTHORITY</u>. WC shall have the legal authority to enter into this agreement, and the institutional, managerial, and financial capability to ensure proper planning, management, and completion of the project, which includes funds sufficient to pay the nonfederal share of project costs, when applicable.

#### B. PROJECT IMPLEMENTATON.

1. WC shall provide staff for overall coordination of all projects listed below. Coordination will include scheduling meetings, reviewing documents, developing



timelines, and ensuring projects are properly documented and communicated between partnership staffs.

- 2. WC shall implement mitigation measures to reduce visitor impacts: Recreation sites that could receive mitigation measures include: Spring Creek Fishing, Pelican Beach (Quist), Pineview Trailhead, BOR Fishing Access/Salamander Day Use, and Old Highway.
- 3. WC mitigation measures shall include temporary installation of portable toilets and/or garbage dumpsters. Mitigation measures will be in place seasonally from the execution date of this agreement until the implementation of site improvements is complete.
- 4. WC shall coordinate mitigation measures with U.S. Forest Service staff.
- 5. WC will conduct preconstruction surveys of recreation sites, including: Pelican/Quist Beach, Spring Creek, Windsurfer/Pineview West Trailhead, Port Ramp, BOR Fishing Access/ Salamander Day Use, Old Highway Fishing and associated infrastructure and trails connecting sites, and the highwater shoreline elevation bordering sites. Surveys will begin September 2021 and completed by year end 2021.
- 6. WC will hire a contractor by year end 2021 when surveys are complete. WC shall complete design work for recreation sites by September 2022 with U.S. Forest Service staff.
- 7. WC shall conduct surveys of sites to the following U.S. Forest Service standards outlined in a statement of work and survey specifications.
- 8. WC shall transfer finished surveys and data to U.S. Forest Service staff to these statement of work specifications.
- 9. WC shall work with U.S. Forest Service staff to develop conceptual designs that can be used to developed construction documents for future implementation.
- 10. WC shall work with U.S. Forest Service staff to develop conceptual designs of the following sites: Spring Creek Fishing, Pelican Beach (Quist), Pineview Trailhead/Port Ramp, BOR Fishing Access/ Salamander Day Use, and Old Highway Fishing.
- 11. WC shall develop designs and/or contract with Architecture and Engineering (A/E) firms to complete full construction documents for all sites listed above.
- 12. Construction documents shall meet the intention of the conceptual designs and design narratives, and also meet the requirements listed in an U.S. Forest Service provided example statement of work and specifications.



- 13. WC shall include U.S. Forest Service staff in county and A/E design reviews. WC shall involve U.S. Forest Service staff in document reviews with WC staff and/or A/E firms and obtain permission to proceed from each stage to the next from U.S. Forest Service engineering staff as outlined in a project statement of work.
- 14. WC shall develop designs that can be implemented by WC, U.S. Forest Service, or contracted firms. Design documents should capture scopes of work and design specifications appropriate to each partner of this agreement.

#### IV. THE U.S. FOREST SERVICE SHALL:

A. PAYMENT/REIMBURSEMENT. The U.S. Forest Service shall reimburse WC for the U.S. Forest Service's share of actual expenses incurred, not to exceed \$206,500.00, as shown in the Financial Plan. In order to approve a Request for Reimbursement, the U.S. Forest Service shall review such requests to ensure payments for reimbursement are in compliance and otherwise consistent with the terms of the agreement. The U.S. Forest Service shall make payment upon receipt of WC's monthly invoice. Each invoice from WC shall display the total project costs for the billing period, separated by U.S. Forest Service and WC's share. In-kind contributions must be displayed as a separate line item and must not be included in the total project costs available for reimbursement. The final invoice must display WCWC's full match towards the project, as shown in the financial plan, and be submitted no later than 120 days from the expiration date.

Each invoice must include, at a minimum:

- 1. WC name, address, and telephone number.
- 2. U.S. Forest Service agreement number: 21-CS-11041906-062
- 3. Invoice date.
- 4. Performance dates of the work completed (start & end).
- 5. Total invoice amount for the billing period, separated by U.S. Forest Service and WC share with in-kind contributions displayed as a separate line item.
- 6. Display all costs, both cumulative and for the billing period, by separate cost element as shown on the financial plan.
- 7. Cumulative amount of U.S. Forest Service payments to date.
- 8. Statement that the invoice is a request for payment by "reimbursement."
- 9. If using SF-270, a signature is required.
- 10. Invoice Number, if applicable.

#### B. <u>PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION</u>.

- 1. U.S. Forest Service staff shall work with WC project coordinator to schedule meetings, review documents, review contracting documents, and implement project objectives.
- 2. U.S. Forest Service staff shall coordinate with WC to ensure mitigation measures are carried out within U.S. Forest Service standards and guidelines and communicate any issues promptly to WC staff so that issues can be quickly and efficiently resolved.
- 3. U.S. Forest Service shall assist with the design of sites around Pineview Reservoir.
- 4. U.S. Forest Service shall work with WC to complete preconstruction surveys of Pineview recreation sites
- 5. U.S. Forest Service shall provide a statement of work, specifications, and reference site maps for any preconstruction site surveys.
- 6. U.S. Forest Service shall review preconstruction surveys for adherence to Statement of Work and specifications
- 7. U.S. Forest Service shall facilitate conceptual site design sessions.
- 8. U.S. Forest Service shall facilitate design charette sessions to capture mutually beneficial site concepts.
- 9. U.S. Forest Service shall provide WC design narratives for each site that receives a conceptual design charrette session.
- 10. U.S. Forest Service shall provide conceptual site designs for each site based on design Charrette sessions.
- 11. U.S. Forest Service shall work with WC to complete Construction Documents for each site receiving conceptual design work.



- 12. U.S. Forest Service shall provide example statement of work and specifications for WC to use when working with A/E firm on recreation facilities.
- 13. U.S. Forest Service shall review all WC and A/E contracted work as specified in the statement of work.
- 14. U.S. Forest Service will provide typical drawings and specifications where appropriate to meet standards that can be utilized at sites (gates, kiosks, etc.). These components will facilitate some consistency at sites around the Reservoir.

B. <u>NOTICES</u>. Any communications affecting the operations covered by this agreement given by the U.S. Forest Service or WC are sufficient only if in writing and delivered in person, mailed, or transmitted electronically by e-mail or fax, as follows:

To the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager, at the address specified in the agreement.

To WC, at the address shown in the agreement or such other address designated within the agreement.

Notices are effective when delivered in accordance with this provision, or on the effective date of the notice, whichever is later.

- C. <u>PARTICIPATION IN SIMILAR ACTIVITIES</u>. This agreement in no way restricts the U.S. Forest Service or WC from participating in similar activities with other public or private agencies, organizations, and individuals.
- D. <u>ENDORSEMENT</u>. Any of WC's contributions made under this agreement do not by direct reference or implication convey U.S. Forest Service endorsement of WC's products or activities.
- E. <u>USE OF U.S. FOREST SERVICE INSIGNIA</u>. In order for WC to use the U.S. Forest Service insignia on any published media, such as a Web page, printed publication, or audiovisual production, permission must be granted from the U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communications (Washington Office). A written request will be submitted by the U.S. Forest Service, Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forest to the Office of Communications Assistant Director, Visual Information and Publishing Services prior to use of the insignia. The U.S. Forest Service, Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forest will notify the WC when permission is granted.
- F. NON-FEDERAL STATUS FOR COOPERATOR PARTICIPANTS. WC agree(s) that any of WC's employees, volunteers, and program participants shall not be deemed to be Federal employees for any purposes including Chapter 171 of Title 28, United States Code (Federal Tort Claims Act) and Chapter 81 of Title 5, United States Code (OWCP), as WC has hereby willingly agreed to assume these responsibilities.

Further, WC shall provide any necessary training to WC's employees, volunteers, and program participants to ensure that such personnel are capable of performing tasks to be completed. WC shall also supervise and direct the work of its employees, volunteers, and participants performing under this agreement.

G. NON-FEDERAL STATUS FOR COOPERATOR LIABILITY. WC agree(s) that any of WC's employees and program participants shall not be deemed to be Federal



employees for any purposes including Chapter 171 of Title 28, United States Code (Federal Tort Claims Act) and Chapter 81 of Title 5, United States Code (OWCP), and WC hereby willingly agree(s) to assume these responsibilities.

WC agree(s) that, except as otherwise provided in this provision below, of WC's volunteers shall not be deemed to be Federal employees and shall not be subject to the provisions of law relating to Federal employment, including those relating to hours of work, rates of compensation, leave, unemployment compensation, and Federal employee benefits. When WC's volunteers are performing approved tasks identified under this agreement, the following applies:

- 1. For the purpose of the tort claim provisions of Title 28 of the United States Code, any of WC's volunteers shall be considered a federal employee.
- 2. For the purpose of subchapter I of Chapter 81 of Title 5 of the United States Code, relating to compensation to Federal employees for work injuries, WC's volunteers shall be deemed civil employees of the United States within the meaning of the term "employee" as defined in section 8101 of title 5, United States Code, and the provisions of that subchapter shall apply.
- 3. For the purposes of claims relating to damage to, or loss of, personal property of WC's volunteer incident to volunteer service, a volunteer shall be considered a Federal employee, and the provisions of 31 U.S.C 3721 shall apply.

Further, WC shall provide any necessary training and support to WC's employees, volunteers, and program participants, to ensure that such personnel are capable of performing tasks to be completed. WC shall also supervise and direct the work of its employees, volunteers, and program participants performing under this Agreement.

- H. <u>MEMBERS OF U.S. CONGRESS</u>. Pursuant to 41 U.S.C. 22, no member of, or delegate to, Congress shall be admitted to any share or part of this agreement, or benefits that may arise therefrom, either directly or indirectly.
- I. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION</u>. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) prohibits discrimination in all its programs and activities on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, and where applicable, sex, marital status, familial status, parental status, religion, sexual orientation, genetic information, political beliefs, reprisal, or because all or a part of an individual's income is derived from any public assistance program. (Not all prohibited bases apply to all programs.) Persons with disabilities who require alternative means for communication of program information (Braille, large print, audiotape, and so forth.) should contact USDA's TARGET Center at (202) 720-2600 (voice and TDD). J. <u>ELIGIBLE WORKERS</u>. WC shall ensure that all employees complete the I-9 form to certify that they are eligible for lawful employment under the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 USC 1324a). WC shall comply with regulations regarding certification and retention of the completed forms. These requirements also apply to any contract awarded under this agreement.

# K. SYSTEM FOR AWARD MANAGEMENT REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT (SAM). WC shall maintain current information in the System for Award Management (SAM) until receipt of final payment. This requires review and update to the information at least annually after the initial registration, and more frequently if required by changes in information or agreement term(s). For purposes of this agreement, System for Award Management (SAM) means the Federal repository into which an entity must provide information required for the conduct of business as a Cooperative. Additional information about registration procedures may be found at the SAM Internet site at www.sam.gov.

#### L. <u>STANDARDS FOR FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT</u>.

#### 1. Financial Reporting

WC shall provide complete, accurate, and current financial disclosures of the project or program in accordance with any financial reporting requirements, as set forth in the financial provisions.

#### 2. Accounting Records

WC shall continuously maintain and update records identifying the source and use of funds. The records shall contain information pertaining to the agreement, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, outlays, and income.

#### 3. Internal Control

WC shall maintain effective control over and accountability for all U.S. Forest Service funds. WC shall keep effective internal controls to ensure that all United States Federal funds received are separately and properly allocated to the activities described in the award/agreement and used solely for authorized purposes.

#### 4. Source Documentation

WC shall support all accounting records with source documentation. These documentations include, but are not limited to, cancelled checks, paid bills, payrolls, contract documents. These documents must be made available to the U.S. Forest Service upon request.

M. <u>LIMITATION OF FUNDS</u>. U.S. Forest Service funds in the amount of **\$206,500.00** are currently available for performance of this agreement through



**December 31, 2022.** The U.S. Forest Service's ability to provide additional funding is contingent upon the availability of appropriated funds from which payment can be made. There is no legal liability on the part of the U.S. Forest Service for any payment above this amount until WC receives notice of availability confirmed in a written modification by the U.S. Forest Service.

- N. <u>INDIRECT COST RATES- PARTNERSHIP</u>. Indirect costs are approved for reimbursement or as a cost-share requirement and have an effective period applicable to the term of this agreement.
  - 1. If the Cooperator has never received or does not currently have a negotiated indirect cost rate, they are eligible for a de minimis indirect cost rate up to 10 percent of modified total direct costs (MTDC). MTDC is defined as all salaries and wages, fringe benefits, materials and supplies, services, travel, and contracts up to the first \$25,000 of each contract.
  - 2. For rates greater than 10 percent and less than 25 percent, the Cooperator shall maintain documentation to support the rate. Documentation may include, but is not limited to, accounting records, audit results, cost allocation plan, letter of indirect cost rate approval from an independent accounting firm, or other Federal agency approved rate notice applicable to agreements.
  - 3. For a rate greater than 25 percent, the U.S. Forest Service may require that the Cooperator request a federally approved rate from the Cooperator's cognizant audit agency no later than 3 months after the effective date of the agreement. The Cooperator will be reimbursed for indirect costs or allowed to cost-share at the rate reflected in the agreement until the rate is formalized in the negotiated indirect cost rate (NICRA) at which time, reimbursements for prior indirect costs or cost-sharing may be subject to adjustment.
  - 4. Failure to provide adequate documentation supporting the indirect cost rate, if requested, could result in disallowed costs and repayment to the U.S. Forest Service.
- O. <u>OVERPAYMENT</u>. Any funds paid to WC in excess of the amount entitled under the terms and conditions of this agreement constitute a debt to the Federal Government. The following must also be considered as a debt or debts owed by WC to the U.S. Forest Service:
  - Any interest or other investment income earned on advances of agreement funds; or
  - Any royalties or other special classes of program income which, under the provisions of the agreement, are required to be returned.

If this debt is not paid according to the terms of the bill for collection issued for the overpayment, the U.S. Forest Service may reduce the debt by:



- 1. Making an administrative offset against other requests for reimbursement.
- 2. Withholding advance payments otherwise due to WC.
- 3. Taking other action permitted by statute (31 U.S.C. 3716 and 7 CFR, Part 3, Subpart B).

Except as otherwise provided by law, the U.S. Forest Service may charge interest on an overdue debt.

P. <u>AGREEMENT CLOSEOUT</u>. Within 120 days after expiration or notice of termination the parties shall close out the agreement.

Any unobligated balance of cash advanced to WC must be immediately refunded to the U.S. Forest Service, including any interest earned in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart D, 200.305.

Within a maximum of 120 days following the date of expiration or termination of this agreement, all financial performance and related reports required by the terms of the agreement must be submitted to the U.S. Forest Service by WC.

If this agreement is closed out without audit, the U.S. Forest Service reserves the right to disallow and recover an appropriate amount after fully considering any recommended disallowances resulting from an audit which may be conducted later.

- Q. <u>FINANCIAL STATUS REPORTS</u>. A Federal Financial Report, form SF-425, must be submitted **quarterly**. The report is due 30 days after the reporting period ending March 31, June 30, September 30, December 31. The final SF-425 must be submitted either with the final payment request or no later than 120 days from the expiration date of the agreement. The form may be found at <a href="https://www.grants.gov/forms/post-award-reporting-forms.html">https://www.grants.gov/forms/post-award-reporting-forms.html</a>.
- R. PROGRAM MONITORING AND PROGRAM PERFORMANCE REPORTS. The parties to this agreement shall monitor the performance of the agreement activities to ensure that performance goals are being achieved. The cooperator may use whatever format it chooses for reporting performance, including Forest Service form SF-1500-23. Notwithstanding, performance reports must contain information on the following:
  - 1. A comparison of actual accomplishments to the goals established for the period. Where the output of the project can be readily expressed in numbers, a computation of the cost per unit of output, if applicable.
  - 2. Reason(s) for delay if established goals were not met.
  - 3. Project activities in the upcoming quarter/reporting period.
  - 4. Additional pertinent information.

WC shall submit quarterly performance reports to the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager. These reports are due 30 days after the reporting period. The final



performance report must be submitted either with WC's final payment request, or separately, but not later than 120 days from the expiration date of the agreement.

S. <u>RETENTION AND ACCESS REQUIREMENTS FOR RECORDS</u>. WC shall retain all records pertinent to this agreement for a period of no less than 3 years from the expiration or termination date. As used in this provision, records includes books, documents, accounting procedures and practice, and other data, regardless of the type or format. WC shall provide access and the right to examine all records related to this agreement to the U.S. Forest Service Inspector General, or Comptroller General or their authorized representative. The rights of access in this section must not be limited to the required retention period but must last as long as the records are kept.

If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the end of the 3-year period, the records must be kept until all issues are resolved, or until the end of the regular 3-year period, whichever is later.

Records for nonexpendable property acquired in whole or in part, with Federal funds must be retained for 3 years after its final disposition.

T. <u>FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT (FOIA)</u>. Public access to agreement records must not be limited, except when such records must be kept confidential and would have been exempted from disclosure pursuant to Freedom of Information regulations (5 U.S.C. 552). Requests for research data are subject to 2 CFR 215.36.

Public access to culturally sensitive data and information of Federally-recognized Tribes may also be explicitly limited by P.L. 110-234, Title VIII Subtitle B §8106 (2009 Farm Bill).

- U. TEXT MESSAGING WHILE DRIVING. In accordance with Executive Order (EO) 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," any and all text messaging by Federal employees is banned: a) while driving a Government owned vehicle (GOV) or driving a privately owned vehicle (POV) while on official Government business; or b) using any electronic equipment supplied by the Government when driving any vehicle at any time. All Cooperators, their Employees, Volunteers, and Contractors are encouraged to adopt and enforce policies that ban text messaging when driving company owned, leased or rented vehicles, POVs or GOVs when driving while on official Government business or when performing any work for or on behalf of the Government.
- V. <u>FUNDING OF EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES</u>. Federal funding under this agreement is not available for reimbursement of WC's purchase of equipment. Equipment is defined as having a fair market value of \$5,000 or more per unit and a useful life of over one year. Supplies are not equipment.
- W. <u>PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS</u>. Improvements placed on National Forest System land, at the direction or with the approval of the U.S. Forest Service, become property

- Y. <u>GOVERNMENT-FURNISHED PROPERTY</u>. WC may only use U.S. Forest Service property furnished under this agreement for performing tasks assigned in this agreement. WC shall not modify, cannibalize, or make alterations to U.S. Forest Service property. A separate document, Form AD-107, must be completed to document the loan of U.S. Forest Service property. The U.S. Forest Service shall retain title to all U.S. Forest Service-furnished property. Title to U.S. Forest Service property must not be affected by its incorporation into or attachment to any property not owned by the U.S. Forest Service, nor must the property become a fixture or lose its identity as personal property by being attached to any real property.

#### Cooperator Liability for Government Property.

- 1. Unless otherwise provided for in the agreement, WC shall not be liable for loss, damage, destruction, or theft to the Government property furnished or acquired under this contract, except when any one of the following applies:
  - a. The risk is covered by insurance or WC is/are otherwise reimbursed (to the extent of such insurance or reimbursement).
  - b. The loss, damage, destruction, or theft is the result of willful misconduct or lack of good faith on the part of WC's managerial personnel. WC's managerial personnel, in this clause, means WC's directors, officers, managers, superintendents, or equivalent representatives who have supervision or direction of all or substantially all of WC's business; all or substantially all of WC's operation at any one plant or separate location; or a separate and complete major industrial operation.

- AA. <u>U.S. FOREST SERVICE ACKNOWLEDGED IN PUBLICATIONS</u>, <u>AUDIOVISUALS AND ELECTRONIC MEDIA</u>. WC shall acknowledge U.S. Forest Service support in any publications, audiovisuals, and electronic media developed as a result of this agreement.
- BB. TRAINING, EVALUATION, AND CERTIFICATION OF SAWYERS. Any of the WC's employees, and any participants and volunteers engaged on behalf of the WC and U.S. Forest Service, who will use chainsaws or crosscut saws on National Forest System lands to conduct the program of work contained in this agreement must be trained, evaluated, and certified in accordance with U.S. Forest Service Manual 2358 and U.S. Forest Service Handbook 6709.11, section 22.48b. The WC is responsible for providing this training, evaluation, and certification, unless the U.S. Forest Service and the WC determine it is not in the best interest of the partnership. In these circumstances, the U.S. Forest Service, upon request and based on availability of agency funding and personnel, may assist with developing and conducting training, evaluation, and certification of the WC's employees, and any volunteers and participants engaged on behalf of the WC and the U.S. Forest Service, who will use chainsaws or crosscut saws on National Forest System lands.
- CC. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION STATEMENT PRINTED, ELECTRONIC, OR</u>
  <u>AUDIOVISUAL MATERIAL</u>. WC shall include the following statement, in full, in any printed, audiovisual material, or electronic media for public distribution developed or printed with any Federal funding.

  - 3. Wholly or partly suspend or terminate the current agreement for WC's program;
