

the East 1/2 of Sec. 11, Tp. 8, North - Range 2, East, Salt Lake Meridian; The nearest identifiable corner to be found being the corner to Sections 12 and 13, on the east boundary of the aforesaid Township and Range. It is situated partly on the eastern, and partly on the western sides of Bear Gulch called also "La Plata Gulch", at the northern limit of La Plata town in Paradise Mining District, Cache County, Utah. The rocks in place upon the claim are limestone. The ore sought for, is lead ore containing silver. There are a few scattering pines upon, and a creek running through this claim. The adjoining and conflicting claims surveyed for Patent, are, the "Mountain Boy" and "Lorette", Lot 39. All the ground as shown in the conflict with the said Lot 39, is to be included in the application of the Red Jacket Mining and Milling Company for Patent, as shown by the accompanying affidavit of the attorney for said Company, and filed herewith. The adjoining and conflicting claims unsurveyed, are, the "Roaring Fork" conflicting with the "Queen of the Hills"; The "Sage Hen" and the "La Plata", adjoining "the Queen of the Hills" on the east and south. There are no adjoining or conflicting claims surveyed and of later lot number, The Post office address of the attorney for the Red Jacket Mining and Milling Company, is J. F. Bagley, Ogden City, Weber County, Utah. The main difference between the recorded location and the location as marked upon the ground of the "Queen of the Hills" claim, consists of the fact that the point of discovery of said claim is located and identified at a point N 49° 08' W. 196.4 ft. from the south end line thereof; whereas the recorded location places the point of discovery directly on the south end line.

I hereby certify that the foregoing survey has been made strictly in accordance with the properly certified copies of the location notices, said location notices being dated "Queen of the Hills", September 12th 1891, and the Red Jacket August 5-1891; and with reference to identified location stakes or corners, That each lode is included within the ground originally located and hitherto claimed, as shown by accompanying affidavits filed herewith of two disinterested witnesses competent and reliable witnesses, J. J. Melbaum and Marius Madsen. I also certify that five hundred dollars worth of labor has been expended, or improvements made upon this claim, consisting of a tunnel 5x6. ft in size, and a shaft 5x6. ft. in size 40. ft deep, and timbered. The mouth of said tunnel begins at a point N 53° W. 122. ft. distant from Post 9. of said Lot 40, and runs S 50° E 20. ft. to the mouth of said shaft, and valued at five hundred and sixty dollars. Also a tunnel known as the Red Jacket tunnel, 5x6. ft. in size partly in solid rock and partly timbered, said tunnel beginning at a point N 83° 06' W. 193. ft. from Post 8. of this Lot, and running West 60. feet to its face, valued at four hundred and eighty dollars. Also four lateral side drifts leading out from said tunnel at various angles thereto, and aggregating 100. ft. in length and valued at eight hundred dollars. Total value of improvements, one thousand eight hundred and forty dollars. And that said expenditure or improvement were made by the claimants or their grantors, for the benefit of this claim, and have not been applied upon any other claim, as shown by accompanying affidavits of Frank E. Fessenden, and Julius Hees, two disinterested, competent and reliable witnesses.
